Alabama students have a blast testing their knowledge at Rocket City Quiz Bowl tournament

Instead of "Houston, we have a problem," it was "Huntsville, we have some questions," as over 100 high school students from across the state traveled to compete in the 2025 AIAA Rocket City Quiz Bowl tournament at the University of Alabama in Huntsville (UAH) on Saturday, Feb. 1. Twenty-two teams competed for trophies along with 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 4th place cash prizes of \$1000, \$750, \$500, and \$250, which teams will use to fund their travel to national tournaments in Chicago and Atlanta.

The eight teams that qualified for playoffs were, in alphabetical order: Alabama School of Cyber Technology and Engineering (ASCTE), Bob Jones High School, Gadsden City High School, Grissom High School, Hewitt-Trussville High School, Hoover High School, Oak Mountain High School, and West Point High School. The playoffs were seeded based on the results of the preliminary games and consisted of quarter-finals, semi-finals, and double-elimination finals. The winning teams are pictured below.

The tournament questions covered the disciplines of science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM), as well as other areas such as history, government, literature, fine arts, current events, and pop culture. Teams competed by answering tossup and bonus questions related to those subjects. Quiz bowl is akin to Jeopardy! for students. The questions, provided by the National Academic Quiz Tournaments (NAQT), are complex and advanced for students' current grade levels.
